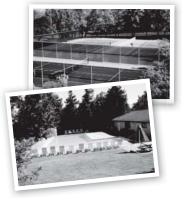

Ads will be placed in the newspaper and on the Internet. Keep watching the **Bollinger Hills website** for updates.

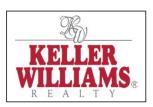
Balloons and directional signs will be placed at the entrances to the neighborhood and at key intersections in the neighborhood.

Macaroni and Cheese With Cauliflower

Serves 6 | Hands-On Time: 15m | Total Time: 40m

Ingredients

12 ounces multigrain elbow macaroni

1 head cauliflower, roughly chopped

4 slices multigrain bread, torn

1/2 cup fresh flat-leaf parsley, chopped

3 tablespoons olive oil

kosher salt and black pepper

1 onion, finely chopped

1 1/2 cups grated extra-sharp Cheddar (6 ounces)

1 1/2 cups reduced-fat sour cream

1/2 cup 1 percent milk

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

Directions

Heat oven to 400° F. Cook the pasta according to the package directions, adding the cauliflower during the last 3 minutes of cooking time; drain. Meanwhile, pulse the bread in a food processor until coarse crumbs form. Add the parsley, 2 tablespoons of the oil, and ¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper; pulse to combine. Return the pasta pot to medium heat and add the remaining tablespoon of oil. Add the onion, ¾ teaspoon salt, and ½ teaspoon pepper and cook, stirring occasionally, until soft, 3 to 5 minutes. Mix in the pasta and cauliflower and the cheese, sour cream, milk, and mustard. Transfer to a shallow 3-quart baking dish, sprinkle with the bread crumbs, and bake until golden brown, 12 to 15 minutes. ENJOY!

JANUARY GARDEN TIPS

Happy New Year! Have you noticed our gardens have been shivering more than usual lately? It has been an exceptionally cold 2010-2011 Winter but Spring will be here before you know it. Here are a few garden activities we can do now to prepare our yards for a healthy growing season ahead...

Weed!

After rain, pulling weeds is easier when the ground is damp.

Clean up!

Removing fallen fruit, branches and larger leaves eliminates potential plant diseases and pests while allowing soils to wake up sooner.

Prune!

Prune deciduous shrubs and trees by removing broken and crossing branches. This helps emphasize the individual character of each plant. Avoid pruning spring flowering trees and shrubs until after they bloom. Wait to prune lime and all citrus trees until after danger of frost which is generally around March 15.

Lawn care!

Fertilize your lawn with a cool season lawn fertilizer to promote health and prevent disease. Re-seed bare lawn patches when the weather is consistently warm.

Irrigation

When re-starting your irrigation system this season carefully check all your irrigation heads and valves and check pipes for possible leaks. Frozen components expand and are more prone to breakage due to the extra cold winter we've had.

Shop for vegetable seeds!

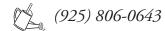
Imagine your bountiful garden and the taste of homegrown tomatoes and start ordering seeds for your garden now.

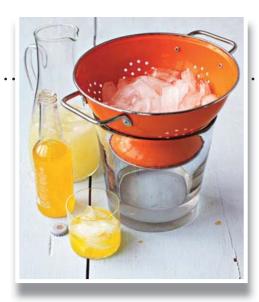
CASSETTE CASE
